






As you know, SAMHSA has updated the GRPA for SOR III. We're going to go over all the details in this training.

These changes will actually support data collection and streamline some things, so we think you will like hearing about this!




- The newly revised GPRA will launch for all starting January 21, 2023
- Even if you started with the current GPRA, once the new GPRA launches you would use the new version of the follow-up and discharge GPRAs. Be sure to have paper versions available by that time.



Now let's talk about why and how the GPRA tool changed.


- As you can see on the slide:
 - They revised questions so that they were trauma-informed
 - Addressed concerns about the collection of sensitive data by limiting such questions to clients served by relevant programs.
 - They modified the tool **to improve data quality** by applying skip patterns, improving question flow, and adding response options to reduce missing data.
 - Reduced client and grantee burden by collecting data necessary.

 Questions that have not been used in routine program evaluation at the Federal level have been removed, and others have been simplified.




This slide shows the High-level overview of the changes made.

- SAMHSA removed 40+ questions –many identified as being traumatizing or insensitive
- They added Questions for clarity and data enrichment –for example, languages spoken at home..
- And some questions were simply revised and moved around.
- The sections with the most changes are
 - Section A (Record Management and Demographics),
 - Section B (now called Substance Use and Planned Services)
 - Discharge GPRA Services received
- Across the GPRA Tool, the "Not Applicable" and "Don't Know" options were removed from many questions to improve data quality.
- Finally, the average time to complete the interview is about 36 minutes.



Section A —which includes record management and demographic questions —is one of the four sections with the most revisions.

- Demographic questions that had been in various sections of the expiring tool are now in Section A.
- They reduced repetition and improved flow with some moves
- And Questions concerning gender identity, sexual orientation, and race have been expanded to include additional categories in the response options.



Section B also had several revisions.


- ICD-10 coding was removed. It was replaced with a question in Section B regarding mental health diagnoses that we'll look at together in a bit.
- Added are Validated questions (from the Addiction Severity Index) concerning previous treatment engagement and questions related to recent experiences with overdose and interventions
 - Wording was revised to simplify content and avoid stigmatization.
- Services were expanded to reflect more diverse and relevant interventions.



- The last section with significant changes is The Discharge Status and Services Received section of the GPRA.
- The services received question contains added modalities and service categories.
- There are also added questions related to telehealth, treatment adherence, and engagement.
- Note: These questions are reported by program staff only at discharge.







The GPRA consists of 8 sections, labeled by letters, A-H. We differentiate the sections as either "administrative" sections or "interview" sections. By administrative, we mean questions that can be completed by agency staff with or without the client present, as they can be answered from the patient's charts/files. Parts of Section A are administrative. Depending on your agency's workflow, this could be pre-filled out by an agency staff before the client comes for the GPRA interview in order to save time/be more efficient.

The Interview sections require the client to be present, as they provide the answers to the questions. The latter parts of Section A and Section B through H are Interview sections.



This Table outlines the New GPRA sections, with strike out of prior titles so you can note the changes more easily.




There are icons throughout the presentation to help give an easy visual of the various changes to the tool.

- Revisions refer to a question from the expiring tool that was retained with changes made in the new tool. Revisions can be minor or significant.
- Minor revisions refers to those that do not change the intent of the question and the response options.
- Significant revisions means that the question did change BUT still collects comparable information.
- Added refers to a new question.
- Moved means a question was relocated in the question sequence within the tool. It used to be in one spot and it's now in another.



- Question 1 moved to Demographics now includes birth month and year only.
- The question text and response options were both revised for question 2. Instead of "What is your gender?" it asks, "What do you consider yourself to be?"
- Additionally, the transgender response option is broken out into two categories and Gender non-conforming was added as a response option.



- The text in question 3 was updated. Instead of "Are you Hispanic or Latino" the question now reads, "Are you Hispanic, Latino/a, or of Spanish origin?"
- If Yes, the interviewer will ask the follow-up question (3a) which was revised. Response options were simplified from Yes/No/Refused for each ethnicity to selecting one or more ethnicity. The list of ethnic groups remains the same.



In question 4 the question text and response options were both revised. Here too, response options were simplified from Yes/No/Refused for each race, to select one or more. In addition, the list of racial groups was expanded from 6 to 16.


The "Other (SPECIFY)" field can be used to capture a race not explicitly listed. One race can be entered in this field.

Questions 5 and 5a were added. They focus on languages other than English spoken at home.

On the Spanish version of the tool, it asks the reverse, "Do you speak a language other than Spanish at home?"




Question 6 is new and focuses on sexual identity.



Question 7, "What is your relationship status?" was added to the new tool.

Question 8, "Are you currently pregnant" moved (from Section C. Family and Living Conditions in expiring tool) to Section A. Demographics.



Question 9 moved. A minor revision was made to the question text which includes the clarification in brackets.


Question 9a also moved. The question text was revised and asks for the number of children under the age of 18 only.

Question 9b was significantly revised. The question focuses on the number of children under the age of 18 living with someone else due to a court's intervention (instead of child protection order).

Question 9c was added and asks whether the client has been reunited with any children under the age of 18. If yes, the question asks for the number of children with whom they've been reunited.

These were moved from section C. Living




Three questions were dropped from Section A and are **not included in the new tool.** We'd like to note that while these specific questions regarding Uniformed Services have been dropped from the tool, there are other questions which capture data related to those connected to the Armed Forces, Reserve, and/or National Guard.

Section B. Question 1 was significantly revised. This is a two-part question with special instructions for each part (A & B).


Part A is asking you to report the number of days, in the past 30 days, that the client reports using a substance. This is administered as an open-ended question, meaning the interviewer should not read the entire list of substances to the client. Instead, the client should be encouraged to list the substances on their own. If they are unsure, the list of substances from the table (which you'll see on the next few slides) can be read to the client.

Some important things to note about question 1:

- Question 1 no longer asks about lifetime use, only use in the past 30 days.
- The misuse of over-the-counter medications to get high should be counted as "misuse of a substance" and reported as such. Misuse of over-the-counter products such as rubber cement, aerosols, gasoline, etc. -which are sniffed, huffed or inhaled -to get high should be counted as misuse and coded under inhalants (which you will see listed on the table).

- Also, because marijuana remains a schedule I substance under federal law, the use of marijuana, whether prescribed or not, should be reported here.
- The appropriate or "as prescribed use" of a prescription drug (such as Tylenol 2, 3, 4, oxycontin, or any prescription drug listed in the table) should NOT be reported in the Question 1 Table. This table is for reporting the MISUSE of prescription or over-the-counter drugs and illicit drugs.

The second part of the question (B.) asks for the route by which the substance is used. More on that in a moment.



The first part of the question, Part A, is the number of days used and the second part of the question, Part B, is the route of administration.

Please note, the response categories for "route" changed, but they are still listed from least to most severe (1-6).

 Number 3 "Vaping" and number 0 "Other" are new routes that were added to the tool

The interviewer should read all six response categories to the client and mark one route only for each substance used. If the client identifies more than one route, the interviewer should choose the corresponding route with the highest associated number value (numbers 1 –6).


For example, if the interviewer asks, "During the past 30 days, how many days have you use any substance and how did you take the substance?" And the client responds that they used heroin for 10 of the past 30 days the interviewer will record "10" under "number of days used" and ask "And how did you take the substance –1. Oral, 2. Intranasal, 3. Vaping, 4. Smoking, 5. Non-IV Injection, 6. IV Injection, or 0. Another route?" If the client responds, "smoking and IV injection" the interviewer will record "6. IV Injection"

because six is higher than four and is a more severe route of administration.

As the table continues, you will notice that **more substances were added throughout this table**.

- Under the Cannabis section, Synthetic Cannabinoids was added.
- For the Sedative, Hypnotic, or Anxiolytics section, you'll see sedatives and hypnotics are two separate categories and Benzodiazepines is now called Anxiolytics/Benzodiazepines.
- The section which captures Cocaine use was split into two separate categories –
 Cocaine and Crack.




- Other added substances include Stimulant medications (under Other Stimulants)
- Hallucinogens and Psychedelics is now broken out into eight categories.



In the Other Psychoactive Substances section, MDPV/Bath Salts, Kratom, and Khat were added.

There are now also response options to record the use of Other tranquilizers, downers, sedatives, and hypnotics not named above.



Lastly, Tobacco and Nicotine were added as well.




Question 2 was significantly revised and **moved from Section A to Section B** in the new tool.


Question 2 asks if the client has been diagnosed with an alcohol use disorder, and if so, which FDA-approved medication(s) did they receive in the past 30 days.

or each medication the client reports receiving in the past 30 days, the interviewer asks the client to specify how many days it was received.

In some cases, the question asks about the number of DOSES. Be sure to note this.




Question 3 follows the same format but asks about opioid use disorder and related medications. Again, note that one of the questions is about DOSES not days.




Questions 4 and 5 are new!

- Question 4 asks if the client has been diagnosed with a stimulant use disorder, and if so, which evidence-based intervention did they receive in the past 30 days.
- Question 5, also new, follows the same pattern as questions 2 (AOD), 3 (OUD), and 4 (StUD) but for tobacco use disorder and related medications.




Question 6 was added and asks about overdose(s) in the past 30 days. If the client reports experiencing an overdose, then question 7 is asked to determine if they received an intervention(s).




Questions 8 and 9 were added.

- Question 8 asks how many times the client has been treated at an inpatient or outpatient facility for a substance use disorder.
- If they report any past treatment, the interviewer asks question 9 about the last time they received treatment.




- Question 10, "Have you ever been diagnosed with a mental health illness by a health care professional?" was added. If the client responds, "Yes" 10a is asked.
 - Question 10a was moved (from the Behavioral Health Diagnoses section in the expiring tool) and both the instructions and response categories were revised.
 - The client is asked to self-report their mental health illnesses, but if preferred, the list in the table can be read to the client.
 - The list begins with, Schizophrenia, schizotypal, delusional, and other non-mood psychotic disorders.


Please note, there is a **NONE OF THE ABOVE is a response option if the client does not report any of the mental health illnesses on the list, at the bottom.**



Next on the list is Mood [affective] disorders, Phobic Anxiety and other anxiety disorders, and Obsessive-compulsive disorders.




Reactions to severe stress and adjustment disorders and Behavioral syndromes associated with physiological disturbances and physical factors, were also added.



Finally, there is the Disorders of adult personality and behavior category.


Please note, NONE OF THE ABOVE is a response option if the client does not report any of the mental health illnesses on the list.



This set of questions is reported by program staff at intake only. Questions 11 and 11a moved (from the Behavioral Health Diagnoses section in the expiring tool to Section B in the new tool).

Question 11 underwent minor revisions —The question text was revised to read "using an evidence-based tool or set of questions." If the program does not screen for co-occurring disorders, then the interviewer can skip to question 12.

If the program does screen for co-occurring disorders, program staff answer question 11a about whether the client screened positive for co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders and question 11b (Added Question), asks if the client was referred for further assessment.




Question 12, the Planned Services section was moved (from Section A of the expiring tool) to Section B in the new tool.

This question underwent significant revisions -service categories were revised, and several categories were added.

These data are still reported by program staff only at intake. Program staff check all the modalities and service categories that will be provided as part of the grant.

Under Modality: eight medications were added.

Under Treatment Services: Treatment/Recovery Planning was made into two separate categories (Treatment Planning and Recovery Planning) and Contingency Management, Community Reinforcement, Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, and Cultural Interventions/Activities were added.




Under Case Management Services there are five added categories, the three types of HIV services, Housing Support, and Health Insurance Enrollment.

Added under Medical Services are OB/GYN Services, Dental Care, Viral Hepatitis Medical Support & Testing, and Other STI Support & Testing.

The Aftercare Service categories are the same as in the previous tool with one revision made to the Self-Help and Mutual Support Groups category (Previously: Self-Help and Support Groups)

Under Education Services, Naloxone Training, Fentanyl Test Strip Training, Viral Hepatitis Education, Other STI Education Services, were ADDED. Substance Abuse Education was changed to Substance Use Education.

Peer-to-Peer Recovery Support Services was changed to Recovery Support Services. And added planned service categories include Vocational Services, Recovery Housing, Recovery Planning, and Case Management Services to Specifically Support Recovery.



Section C. was reduced to two questions about living conditions.


In question 1, minor revisions were made to the Housed subcategories to be more inclusive of different living situations. Wording to include trailers was added to the first two subcategories as seen here. The Halfway House option was expanded to include Transitional Housing and there is now an additional response subcategory for clients living in Recovery Residence or Sober Living.

Question 2 was added and asks if the person is living with anyone who over the past 30 days has regularly used alcohol or other substances.




For Section D Question1, response options of "Other" and "Don't Know" were removed for simplicity.

Number 2, has fewer response options




question 3's response options, which asks about employment status, were revised for clarity but no new response options were added.

Question 4, is a new question that asks the client if they individually have enough money to pay for eight types of living expenses. Choices are read aloud and they should choose all that apply.



Question 5 is a new question that asks about annual income from all sources.




Two questions were dropped from Section D. The questions related to annual income and living expenses were streamlined to reduce burden.




Section E. Legal was revised.

In question 1 –"In the past 30 days, how many times have you been arrested?" – clarification was added in brackets and "currently incarcerated" was added as a response option.

In question 3 –the question stem –"Are you currently on parole or probation" was clarified to include "intensive pretrial supervision" and response options were added.

Question 4, is an added question related to current participation in a drug court program or deferred prosecution agreement.





For question 2, both the question text and instructions changed. The question no longer includes the phrase "not due to your use of alcohol or drugs."


In question 3, response options changed –it now includes "No Reported Mental Health Complaints in the Past 30 Days."



Three new questions related to access to medical care and health insurance were added.

Question 4 asks where the client has gone to receive medical care in the past 30 days.

Questions 5 and 5a –Asks if the client currently has medical or health insurance, and if so, what type of insurance they have. The client can select more than one type of insurance and/or coverage.




These questions were dropped from Section F, including the entire section on violence and trauma.

We'd also like to remind folks, that while these specific questions were dropped, similar data is captured elsewhere in the new tool. The goal here and elsewhere was to ask questions that are applicable to the general population.




In Section G. Social Connectedness, questions around involvement in self-help groups were combined to reduce burden and a new question about social connections to support recovery was added.

Question 1 was revised to include all types of self-help groups and now indicates that voluntary mutual support groups for recovery could be in-person or virtual attendance.



Question 3 –which asks about satisfaction with personal relationships also remains mostly unchanged. The "Don't Know" response option was removed.

Question 4 –Is a new/added question about realizing the need to change social connections and/or places that negatively impact a person's recovery.



Questions 3 and 4 underwent minor revisions with the question text being revised.



Questions 5 and 6 are new.

Question 5 asks program staff if the program provided Naloxone and/or Fentanyl Test Strips to the client at any time during the involvement in the grant program.

And question 6 asks program staff if the client is fully vaccinated against the virus that causes COVID-19.


If a client reports having received two doses of the Pfizer, Moderna, or Novavax vaccines, or one dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, they are considered fully vaccinated. If they received only one dose of Pfizer or Moderna/Spikevax, or none of the vaccines, they are not fully vaccinated.

Services Received Under Grant Funding is reported by program staff only at discharge. The categories here align with to the categories in Section B. Planned Services that we already reviewed so we won't dig into those here.

For Modality -- The stem of the question remains the same. It asks program staff to report the number of days of services provided to the client during the client's course of treatment/recovery.

Please make sure to read all the instructions in the question when you are administering the GPRA you know how to answer it correctly.



Questions 2 through 4b are new. (And also reported by program staff only at discharge.)

Question 2 asks, "Has this client attended 60% or more of their planned services?"

Question 3 asks, "Did this client receive any services via telehealth or a virtual platform?"

And Section, questions 4 through 7 follow a format similar to those in Section B. Planned Services (B2 through B5).


Question 4 asks, "Has this client previously been diagnosed with an opioid use disorder (OUD)?"

If Yes, question 4a asks, "In the past 30 days which FDA-approved medication did the client receive for the treatment of this opioid use disorder? [CHECK ALL THAT APPLY]." If the client received the medication, staff should specify how many days (out of the last 30) they received it.


Question 4b asks if the client has taken the medication as prescribed.

O No [SKIP TO QUESTION 6] 5a. In the past 30 days, which FDA-approved medication did the client receive for the treatment of this alcohol use disorder? [CHECK ALL THAT APPLY.] O Naltrexone	
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Question 5 follows the same format as question 4 but focuses on alcohol use disorder and associated medications.




Question 6 follows the same format but focuses on stimulant use disorder and associated interventions.



Question 7 follows the same format but focuses on tobacco use disorder and associated medications.





The Q by Q is a great tool to help understand every question in the GPRA. It is organized by the sections of the GPRA tool.

For each section there is an overview as well as definitions that apply to the items in that section. This is a great tool to refer to if you ever aren't sure about a particular item, what it's asking, how to categorize certain responses, etc. Many folks we have trained try to have this with them when conducting their first few interviews as you can refer to it quickly if need be. We would encourage you and your staff to get familiar with this resource.
